Access Rights	The law explicitly states that the "public, individually and collectively and represented by a free press, should have access to the records of government." No search fees allowed; cost cannot exceed actual copying cost; no fee waivers
Destruction of Public Records	"Any person who, with intent to prevent public inspection of a record pursuant to this article, willfully conceals or destroys any such record shall be guilty of a violation." Records cannot be destroyed except in accordance with the retention schedule.
